A Message from Our President Surviving the Summer of Sad

I, like many of you, am in the season of life where visitations, funerals, memorials, and writing of sympathy cards seem to be too frequent. This summer has been particularly sad for me. In May we lost a nephew at age 19 to a drug overdose. In August we lost a sister-in-law. Same family, two deaths in three months. In July, a dear friend lost her son at age 47. Less than two weeks later, this friend also lost her only sibling, her sister, at age 69. All of these deaths were sudden, and unexpected, and almost unbearably sad. Each brought many questions. Questions for God: Why at 19? Why at 47? A mother and father should not be burying their child, no matter their age.

Why God??? Why?

As I contemplated these tragedies, they were compounded by the news of deaths from gun violence. Perhaps you read the article about the principal at Urbana High School who moved here after 10 years in the profession elsewhere, only to experience the death of one of his students within a few months of arriving. It is in our neighborhoods, our city, our state, our nation. It is in Buffalo, Uvalde and Champaign.

UWF hosted a Faith Talk podcast on September 1 discussing gun violence. I had other obligations, but I plan to listen to it as soon as it is posted on the website. In two weeks they will have a discussion about decriminalization of black students. Our national organization is becoming a light in the darkness for these issues. They give me hope that we can make a difference when we work together.

This post on Facebook put the summer in perspective:

"You'll survive."

That's the first thing they tell you after you lose someone. And, you know what, they're right.

In time, we all find a way to pick up the pieces and move on. What they forget to mention, however, is that survival and happiness aren't the same thing.

So, as we approach the fall, I am ready for a new season, to move forward, maybe not yet to happiness, but with gratitude and with hope. It is a season to be thankful for the lives that were lived. It is a time to focus on the living, and on how each of us can make life better for another. That's what United Women in Faith is all about. We CAN make a difference by and through mission.

I've missed our gatherings over the summer, and I look forward to our Fall Special Program. Please join us on September 14 as we hear from a woman who recognized a need in our own community and who is now helping other women to succeed. She has given hope to our sisters. This would be a great time to bring a friend to one of our gatherings. For, we are all in this together.... Hope to see you there...

What is Orphan's Treasure Box?

Orphans Treasure Box is a faith based organization that sells thousands of donated books to support orphans and the families who adopt them. They also give away money to those in need...even in the midst of a pandemic. Last year they helped children in Swaziland, Peru, Haiti and locally in Illinois.

Over the past year, the outlet store has provided



books for a women's prison in Illinois, a ministry serving immigrants and refugees in Texas, an organization that ships

Bibles and Christian resources around the world, and several food pantries, libraries, and schools.

How is a tradition born?

The First Annual Ice Cream Social!

We were interested in finding out from the eight women who came to the midsummer event, what motivated them to attend and the unanimous response was "ice cream"!

Of course! So, whatever event is planned

for next July should definitely feature ice cream—along with our favorite toppings!

The plan was to watch and discuss an episode of UWF Faith Talks Podcast called "Mom's in Prison." It turned out that that podcast was not yet up on the UWF website. Our attendees were very patient and even stepped in to try to help as we searched for an alternative.

Eventually we chose a video episode of Voices from the Field—featuring missionaries speaking live from their mission site. We watched the missionaries from Liberia and used closed captions in order to better understand the speakers—not a perfect solution, but nevertheless...

Here are a few observations made by our women after viewing the video:

- It was fun to share the evening with eight other ladies, including Pastor Julia.
- The mission statement of the missionaries in Liberia is, "Not for ourselves, but for others."
- The missionaries were filmed wearing UMW printed fabrics. They were quite colorful and definitely got everyone's attention.
- The main issues highlighted in the video were human trafficking and teen pregnancy. Nearly one-third of girls become pregnant before 18.
- The missionaries are working hard to overcome these issues. They have a 5 year plan for a contained area which would offer housing, training, and childcare to help the girls earn a living so that they didn't have to work the streets as prostitutes.

The consensus of the group was that this particular video was not as appealing as the "Mom's in Prison" podcast would have been. However, the ice cream sundaes were sensational! Thanks to Karen Wood for providing the ice cream and the attendees for providing the delicious toppings.

Information that You Absolutely Need to Know for the Sunday Morning Markets!

Important Packaging Information

- ✓ Leave pies whole; cover with plastic wrap.
- Cookies and brownies by the half-dozen (these sell best) or dozen. Arrange them on a paper or plastic plate, securely covered in plastic wrap; or in clear plastic containers. Please, no plastic bags!
- ✓ Small loaves of breads sell best; use plastic wrap (not aluminum foil).
- ✓ Attach a small piece of paper or label identifying the baked item and listing any unusual or perhaps allergenic ingredients, (such as nuts) or other helpful information (e.g. sugar-free; gluten-free).
- ✓ We will provide attractive labels for your baked goods.

Important Delivery Information

- ✓ Cakes and other baked goods must be delivered to the church between 10 a.m. and noon on Saturday, October 1 or no later than 10 a.m. on Sunday, October 2.
- ✓ Pies and other baked goods must be delivered to the church between 10 a.m. and noon on Saturday, October 8, or no later than 10 a.m. on Sunday, October 9.
- ✓ Jars of soup should be delivered to the church on Saturday, October 1 or no later than 10 a.m. on Sunday, October 2.
- ✓ If you'd like someone to pick up your

 baked goods and deliver them to church, please call Anne McKenney (217)356-4728)

Important "Market" Dates

Bring items for baskets anytime, but no later than 5 p.m. on September 19

Sign up for baked goods, and pick up soup recipes, Mason jars, and plastic cake/pie carriers at the UMW table, September 18 and 25

Bring quarts of soup to church between 10 a.m. and noon on Saturday, October 1, or no later than 10 a.m. on Sunday, October 2

Bring cakes and other baked goods to the church between 10 a.m. and noon on Saturday, October 1 or no later than 10 a.m. on Sunday, October 2

Bring pies and other baked goods between 10 a.m. and noon on Saturday, October 8, or no later than 10 a.m. on Sunday, October 9

Silent Auction opens at 10 a.m., October 2

Silent Auction closes at NOON, October 9
